Permaculture is important to me because...

Without discovering something like permaculture, which enables you to really connect with nature's wisdom, people will not break free from the consumerist way of thinking. Its all about changing belief and thought patterns and the best way of doing that is not preaching, but doing something practical that works, inspires, and creates new connections.



Becoming a LAND Centre has really spurred me on to share the permie ideas I've implemented here, from the washing line bean 'tent', to the trampoline solar hot tub, or the pallet reedbed. First they laugh, then they say, 'Wow I've never thought of that, I could do that!'

Inspiring enthusiasm in others is the best way of keeping your own energies circulating and makes you realise how far you've come. This is my first year of opening to the public and I'm offering a few workshops, open days, and can give personal guided visits.
